Outstanding Performances

- Andrew Trifilo had an outstanding season with the ball for the Second XI—claiming 6/38 in Round 9 and 6/64 in Round 14. Andrew made his debut in the First XI this year, and we see him, along with the much-improved Brad Jago, as part of the attack going forward.
- In the Third XI, Liam Doherty's amazing 194 in Round 1 showcased his potential.
- Also in the Third XI, James Dobeli scored a slashing 103 in Round 8.

First XI Captain's Report

The First XI entered the season full of optimism, buoyed by new recruits and a strong pre-season.

After a promising practice match in Shepparton, unfortunately, injuries and inconsistent form derailed our season. We struggled to play consistent cricket, finishing with just one win and ultimately being relegated back to A Turf.

Despite the lack of wins, there were still plenty of positives, as we fielded the youngest side in the competition.

We kicked off our season against a strong Heathmont team, delivering an outstanding performance in the field. Chasing 174, we found ourselves in trouble at 8/110 with 8.3 overs remaining. That's when Joe and Hugh Paulas joined forces at the crease, putting on a batting masterclass and dismantling the Heathmont attack all over the school ground. Hugh launched their best bowler onto the freeway, leaving us needing just seven runs from the final over. Unfortunately, we fell agonizingly short, losing by just one run.

This became a recurring theme throughout the season. We lost another match in the final over, fell short by 27 runs in another, and had both games against the other bottom-ranked side affected by rain. In one of those matches, we were robbed of a sure victory due to Melbourne's unpredictable weather.

Our younger players, however, showed plenty of promise, and at times, we proved we could compete with the best teams in the competition.

A highlight of the season was our Round 11 victory over Deepdene, who were on top of the ladder at the time and later finished as runners-up. After sensational innings from Luke Brynes (37), Nabil (68*), and Joey (21 off 14 balls), we posted 177 on a tough pitch. The lads then put together the perfect game, with Nabil, Brad, Narns, and Joey bowling brilliantly to skittle them for just 66 in front of their home crowd, who were hosting a function.

One of the biggest positives for the club was the development of Nathan Jago, not only as a player but also as a leader. Narns displayed maturity beyond his years with the bat, highlighted by a gritty 68* on a tough pitch against Marcellin, followed by a match-winning spell of 6/21 against Deepdene. He works extremely hard at training and has started to find his voice as a leader within the group.

Brad Jago forced his way into the First XI early in the season and is the club's hardest trainer. It was fantastic to see him rewarded with a great season. He bowls an impeccable line and length, moving the ball both ways, making him a difficult prospect for batsmen.

Joey Paulas continued to develop as a player, forming key batting partnerships with Nabil and delivering some great spells with his accurate leg-spin.

Hugh Paulas may not have taken as many wickets as last season, but his two-day bowling performances were outstanding. He also continued to develop his batting and contribute valuable runs.

Rowan Jayaweera finished the season as our second-highest run-scorer, setting a great example for the younger players with his patience and application at the crease.

Benny Raymond kept brilliantly during the second half of the season and continued to develop his batting, producing some powerful innings.

Our standout performer with both bat and ball was our 19-year-old overseas sensation, Nabil Moughal. He topped the league in runs with an impressive 616 at an average of 47.38 and made

his mark with the ball, taking 21 wickets at 20 to finish 10th in the league. On and off the field, "Billy" was a true star—his banter and infectious energy lifted the entire team.

We also had the opportunity to debut Andrew Trifilo, Adrian Benno, and Chanul Ratnayake—our youngest-ever First XI player at just 13. All three showed they are up to the standard and will be looking to play consistent First XI cricket next season.

For a team that finished with just one win, our morale remained fantastic throughout the season, and we had a lot of fun along the way.

I believe that relegation may be a blessing in disguise. If this group sticks together, plenty of success awaits.

Second XI Captain's Report

The 2024/2025 season was meant to be one of redemption. However, we unfortunately fell short during the regular season and missed out on finals.

Despite the usual challenges of a Second XI team, the boys fought hard and delivered some exceptional individual and collective performances. The season was a testament to the character of the players and their commitment to the club's vision.

We had an unusual start to the season, playing our first home game away on a Sunday against Ashwood. This was followed by an away match against Richmond City, where we initially thought we had drawn—only for a recount to upgrade us to a win a few hours later! Despite spending half the season in the First XI, when he played with us, he showed why he is a player of the future—claiming not one but two six-wicket hauls (6/64 and 6/38). Another player who split time between the First and Second XI, Brad Jago, also delivered a memorable five-wicket haul (5/33).

Additionally, our young gun Adrian Benno impressed with the ball, consistently taking wickets and showing great improvement with each game.

Looking ahead—not only to next season but to future years—I'm confident this team can continue to grow. With the core group of players we had this season, along with younger players making a

name for themselves in other grades, the foundations are strong. We have a great mix of talent and experience, and I have no doubt we will improve over the coming seasons.

It was a season filled with highs and lows, but through it all, the team remained united. The support the boys showed for each other was outstanding. With another year of development, I'm hopeful we can come back stronger and make a real push for promotion back into C Turf, where we belong.
